

Amazing Grace - UMH #378

Today, we focus on Amazing Grace, one of the best loved hymns of all time.

Background

John Newton was born in England in 1725. His mother died when he was six years old. His father was a sea captain and when he was eleven, he became an apprentice on his father's ship. For years, he went from port to port, ship to ship "enjoying all the experiences and immoralities offered in each exotic port." He became a slave trader and made three voyages as captain of slave ships.²

John Newton was converted under the influence of George Whitfield and the Wesleys. He was later ordained and became both a leader in the evangelical wing of the Church of England and a vigorous opponent of slavery.

His tombstone epitaph sums up his experience:

"John Newton, clerk, once an infidel and libertine, a servant of slavers in Africa, was, by the rich mercy of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, preserved, restored, pardoned and appointed to preach the faith he had long labored to destroy."

Theology

Grace

God's grace is one of the central themes of this hymn. Grace is God's freely given and unmerited love that makes it possible for us to live as a child of God.

Spiritual Journey

Another key theme of this hymn is that of a spiritual journey throughout life. "John Newton was referring to his own life and experience when he wrote this monumental hymn."

'Twas grace that taught my heart to fear, and grace my fears relieved; how precious did that grace appear the hour I first believed.

Verse 3 - Reflection on Journey

Through many dangers, toils, and snares, I have already come; 'tis grace hath brought me safe thus far, and grace will lead me home.

Verse 4 - Looks to the Future

The Lord has promised good to me, his word my hope secures; he will my shield and portion be, as long as life endures.

Verse 5 - Steadfast Faith

Yea, when this flesh and heart shall fail, and mortal life shall cease, I shall possess, within the veil, a life of joy and peace.

Verse 6 - Eternal Life

When we've been there ten thousand years, bright shining as the sun, we've no less days to sing God's praise than when we'd first begun.
