What is this sermon about?

This sermon is about the background story of What a Friend We Have In Jesus and Leaning on the Everlasting Arms, as well as addressing the Charleston Church Shootings.

Why is this sermon important?

This sermon is important because the faith we sing sustains us during dark times and it is important to consider the Charleston Church Shootings in light of our faith.



What is the context of this sermon?

This sermon is preached as an extension of the Then Sings My Soul before a Sunday off. On Wednesday evening, a gunman opened fire at the Emanuel African Methodist Episcopal Church, one of the nation's oldest black churches, killing nine.

What are the next action steps?

Choose light and life.

Choose to follow Jesus Christ, Emmanuel - God is with us.

What a Friend We Have in Jesus - UMH #526

Background

[Joseph Scriven] experienced tragedy in his life. He was born in 1819 in Ireland. He was engaged to be married and the night before their wedding day, his fiancee was thrown off her horse into a river and drowned.

He migrated to Canada and began a new life. He was again engaged to be married, yet his fiancee died from illness before they were married. Around that same time, "Scriven received news that his mother, back in Dublin, was seriously ill. He did not have the funds to finance a trip home, so he wrote the three verses of a poem he titled 'Pray without Ceasing' and sent them to his mother hoping they would lift her spirits and comfort her.

Some time later, when Scriven himself was confined to his bed with illness, a neighbor stopped in to see him. As they talked, the friend saw a paper at the side of the bed with the words of Scriven's power scrawled on it. After reading the powm, the man inquired if Scriven had written it. He replied, "The Lord and I did it between us." Securing Scriven's permission, the neighbor saw to it that the poem was published in a small collection of poetry called *Hymns and Other Verses*.²

Leaning on the Everlasting Arms - UMH #133

Background

"Anthony Showalter was a Presbyterian elder and a well-known advocate of gospel music. He published over 130 music books ... and became known throughout the south for his signing schools in local churches.

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One day in 1887, he received two letters from former students, each of whom had lost their wife. Show alter went to the Bible, looking for a verse to comfort them. He selected Deuteronomy 33:27a

The most ancient God is a place of safety; the eternal arms are a support. ...3

As he pondered that verse, the words of the chorus came to mind. Show alter wrote to a friend, Elisha A. Hoffman, to ask for help writing the verses. Hoffman sent back three verses. Show alter set it all to music, and ever since, these words have cheered us in adversity.⁴

Charleston Church Shootings

By now, you have heard the news that "A gunman opened fire at Emanuel African Methodist Episcopal Church [in Charleston, South Carolina] on Wednesday evening, killing nine people, including the pastor.

The police arrested a suspect on Thursday in Shelby, N.C. Federal and state officials have opened a hate crime investigation into the attack."⁵

Why would someone do this?

Why would God allow this?

Who is to blame?

It just doesn't make sense.

Let's take a closer look at some of these questions.

Why would someone do this?

At times like this one of the most frequent questions that we ask ourselves and other people is, "Why?"

Why would someone walk into Bible study sit with the group talking Scripture for nearly an hour before drawing a gun and starting to fire?⁶

In this case it seems clear that the gunman was racially motivated. One of the stories which defined his life was that whites are victims and are being threatened by African Americans. This is a dark and twisted view of reality.

Evil and Darkness

What happened on Wednesday was evil. The gunman had allowed his mind to be taken over so completely by racism and darkness that he made a choice to kill others.

He gave in to the darkness.

He chose evil.

Transition

So, why would an all powerful and all loving God allow such evil to happen?

Why would God allow this?

God's Plan

Sometimes people say, "It must have been the will of God." or "It is part of God's plan, we simply have to trust God."

Let me be clear:

God never intends us to choose evil.

The Charleston Church Shootings were not part of God's plan.

Racism, murder and tragedy will never be God's will.

Evil is never, ever God's plan.

Free Will

If this is not the will of God, why did 9 people die on Wednesday?

It happened because of the choices that we make as humans.

When God created humanity and placed us in the middle of a beautiful garden he gave us free will – the ability to consider options and make choices. We have the opportunity to choose good and turn toward God or evil and turn away from God.

The ability to choose to freely and heartily love God and our neighbor comes with the ability to choose to turn away from God and act out evil.

The gunman did not realize or chose to ignore the choices that could have been made for good. He chose evil.

Racism

His choices were motivated by racism and fueled with paranoia and fear.

When we give in to paranoia and fear of people who are different than ourselves, we become more and more fearful. This leads to a desire to separate or protect ourselves or to destroy those who are different.

Conclusion

At a hearing on Friday, the "victims' family members offered lessons in forgiveness, testaments to a faith that is not compromised by violence or grief. Let's take a look:

One by one, they looked to the screen in a corner of the courtroom on Friday, into the expressionless face of the young man charged with making them motherless, snuffing out the life of a promising son, taking away a loving wife for good, bringing a grandmother's life to a horrific end. And they answered him with forgiveness.

They urged [the gunman] to repent, confess his sins and turn to God.

"You took something very precious away from me," said Nadine Collier, daughter of 70-year-old Ethel Lance, her voice rising in anguish. "I will never talk to her ever again. I will never be able to hold her again. But I forgive you. And have mercy on your soul."

"We welcomed you Wednesday night in our Bible study with open arms," said Felicia Sanders, the mother of 26-year old Tywanza Sanders, a poet who died after trying to save his aunt, who was also killed.

"You have killed some of the most beautifulest people that I know," she said in a quavering voice. "Every fiber in my body hurts, and I will never be the same. Tywanza Sanders is my son, but Tywanza was my hero. Tywanza was my hero. But as we say in Bible study, we enjoyed you. But may God have mercy on you."

Good News

The good news is that "There is no fear in love, but perfect love drives out fear."8

Each one of us has choices to make every day.

We choose between good and evil.

We choose between forgiveness and resentment.
