Series Review

Today, we begin a new series, Discipleship #1: Oil Fields and Faith. Many of you know the story of the discovery of oil 100 years ago at a well called Stapleton #1. From the 1910's through the 1950's oil permeated every aspect of life in Butler County and continues to be an integral part of our life today.

During this series, we are going to be remember some of the stories from the oil fields to see what they can teach us about our faith. We are collaborating with the Kansas Oil Museum to bring you some of these stories. Each week, we will focus on a different aspect of our oil history, connect it with the story of scripture and consider how what we find can help us grow as followers of Jesus Christ.

Leave a Legacy

Definition

One of the definitions in the dictionary of a legacy is "a thing handed down by a predecessor." We have things handed down to us in a variety of settings. You can think about the legacy of:

- · Family parents, grandparents
- Community El Dorado, Butler County
- Sports Teams Grizzlies, Wildcats, Shockers, Royals

Good and Bad - Kansas City Royals

Legacies can be good and bad. They are not necessarily one or the other. Think for a moment about the Kansas City Royals. For many years the legacy of the Kansas City Royals – a thing handed down by a predecessor - was a losing team. It was not a lot to be excited about. This is what was handed down.

In the past few years, this has changed. They made it to the World Series last year and right now, they have the second best record in baseball. This is a very different kind of legacy.

Your Legacy

So, here's my question for you.

What kind of legacy will you leave?

What will you pass down to those who come after you?

Transition

Today we are going to take a closer look at the legacy that has been left for us here in Butler county and in our lives of faith.

First, let's consider the scripture passage and legacy in our lives of faith

Legacy of Discipleship

Mission

Our mission as a church is to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. We live as a disciple by engaging in spiritual practices to worship, grow, give, serve and share.

We did not just make this up.

This is who Jesus sent us to be.

This is the legacy that we have received from those who have gone before us.

Jesus says, "Go to this Mountain"

I want to remind you of the context of the scripture passage which was read a few moments ago. Jesus has been crucified, resurrected and appeared to his disciples.

Disciples—That's what we are trying to make, right? We start off with eleven.

Jesus told these eleven disciples to travel to this particular mountain

This is where they go.

This is the legacy that we have received.

- Go where Jesus tells us to go.
- · Know what Jesus knows.
- Be like Jesus

Your Legacy and Your Mission: Make Disciples

Then he sent them on a mission.

Jesus said, you don't need to ask to speak to the manager or talk to the owner.

Jesus says, I'm it. I am the top guy – all authority on heaven and earth has been given to me. Here is what I want you to do, this will be your legacy:

Go.

Make Disciples.

Make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to obey everything that I've commanded you. This charge, which Jesus gives to these eleven disciples, has left a legacy over 2,000 years later.

This is what our church wakes up every day to do—to follow that commandment. First United Methodist Church is part of the legacy of this scripture.

You are part of the legacy of this scripture.


In every one of these sermons, we are going to overlay the story of our faith with a story from the history of the oil fields in Butler County.
