Opening Story - Being an Outsider

Frontier Western Celebration

Shortly after we moved to town in 2012, we bought tickets to the Frontier Western Celebration. I didn't know much about the event other than the promotional material. We showed up and were making our way to a seat in the stands. We were sitting there, taking it all in, when I started to realize something that was different about me.

I was the only guy who was wearing shorts at the Frontier Western Celebration Not only that, I was the only guy wearing open toed shoes at the rodeo. I was wearing flip-flops.

"I'm not from around here."

My wardrobe made it clear that I was new to Butler County. It was easy to pick me out as an outsider.

Transition

The shepherds were outsiders in Jesus' day and not just by what they were wearing.

God Welcomes the Outsider

Shepherds

Of course, we hear the story of the shepherds every year and it can be easy to romanticize them, but let's be realistic. In the first century, they were among the lowest rungs of the socio-economic ladder.

If it was a large herd, the shepherds probably did not own their sheep. They were hired hands and those that were working the night shift were the lowest of the low.

When God first told the good news of Jesus birth, it was to outsiders. God invites the lowest of the low to come and see the newborn king. This gives us a clue to what kind of king which Jesus would be.

Jesus Time with Outsiders

Jesus would spend most of his time with those that others said were out. There are outsiders right here in El Dorado. It can be easy to make assumptions about who is in or who is out, who is welcome or unwelcome.

Good News

The good news is that Jesus birth brings a kingdom in which all are welcome, especially those on the outside.

There are no preconditions.

God welcomes the outsider.

Call to Action

This is true for each one of us.

God welcomes all people and offers us love and grace.

As we prepare to celebrate the birth of Christ in 11 days, I invite you to look for someone on the outside who you might offer a welcome.
