What is this sermon about?

This sermon is about growing in our faith outside of worship both on our own through reading the Bible and praying and with other people as part of a small group.

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John 15:1-8, CEB

1"I am the true vine, and my Father is the vineyard keeper. ²He removes any of my branches that don't produce fruit, and he trims any branch that produces fruit so that it will produce even more fruit. ³You are already trimmed because of the word I have spoken to you. ⁴Remain in me, and I will remain in you. A branch can't produce fruit by itself, but must remain in the vine. Likewise, you can't produce fruit unless you remain in me. ⁵I am the vine; you are the branches. If you remain in me and I in you, then you will produce much fruit. Without me, you can't do anything. ⁶If you don't remain in me, you will be like a branch that is thrown out and dries up. Those branches are gathered up, thrown into a fire, and burned. ⁷If you remain in me and my words remain in you, ask for whatever you want and it will be done for you. ⁸My Father is glorified when you produce much fruit and in this way prove that you are my disciples.

Series Review

Discipleship Pathway

During this worship series, we are focusing on our discipleship pathway, which is this:

We live as disciples of Jesus Christ as we worship, grow, give, serve and share.

These are expectations for our members and invitations to all people to experience life as a follower of Jesus Christ. There are many ways to live a faithful life. This is how we live as Christians here at First United Methodist Church.

Lessons from a Pumpkin Farm

We will hear from Carroll and Becky Walters of Walters' Farm. They will be sharing stories on video about their life, pumpkins and the farm. We will be looking for lessons that a pumpkin farm can teach us about living as a follower of Jesus Christ.

Transition

Today, we consider how to grow in our faith and produce fruit in God's kingdom.

Producing Fruit in God's Kingdom

In the scripture passage from John for today, Jesus describes a vine, its branches and the fruit that is produced.

Example: Pumpkin Vine, Flowers, Leaves and Pumpkins

You might imagine a pumpkin plant as it spreads across a field. It puts out blooms that will later turn into pumpkins. If you break off one of the flowers - disconnect it from the vine - it will never turn into a pumpkin. If you break the vine, everything that is past the break - leaves, branches and flowers - will stop growing. It will die.

The connection is essential for growth to occur.

Stay Connected with Jesus

The same thing is true in our life of faith. In this passage of scripture, Jesus identifies himself as the vine and his Father as the Vineyard keeper. Those of who hear or read these words are identified as the branches on the vine. These branches are where the fruit is produced.

Just like with the pumpkin plant, connection is essential for growth to occur. We need to stay connected with Jesus for our souls to be well and to produce fruit in God's Kingdom.

What is fruit in God's Kingdom?

Of course, as we consider our faith, we aren't growing pumpkins, fruits or vegetables of any kind. Producing fruit in God's kingdom means that:

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- We honor and glorify God.
- We love God and love our neighbor.

Key Scripture: Galatians 5:22-23

We find this idea of fruit in God's kingdom described in Galatians 5:22-23:

"But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. There is no law against things like this."²

Did you hear those?

Love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. That's the kind of life that I want to live.

That is the kind of life we can live when we stay connected with Jesus.

Our Discipleship Pathway

So, how do we stay connected with Jesus?

Here at First United Methodist Church we believe that the spiritual practices of our discipleship pathway open us to God's grace so that we can stay connected to the vine – we can stay connected with Jesus.

Series Review and Transition to Grow.

As we considered last week, worship helps us stay connected with Jesus.

We also have the opportunity to grow in our faith outside of worship, both on our own and with other people. We can engage in practices that open our souls for God to be at work - that help us stay connected.

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bluestem grass, that part of the farm, more than the bottom ground - where we farm. You have to... The farm ground, you have to keep doing something to it all the time.

Becky: [laughing] That's the way the good Lord feels about us. He keeps having to work on us all the time.

Carroll: Kind of hits us on the head once in a while, too...

Becky: I know it, I know it... [laughing]

Response to Video

God keeps working on us - all the time.

God's Grace Works on Us

As United Methodist Christians, we talk about God's love and willingness to forgive as grace. It is this grace - God's grace - that works on us. God's grace is available to all people, at all times of life and we are all in different places in our spiritual life.

Prevenient Grace

God is at work in our life before we are aware of it.

No matter who you are, what you have done or what your life is like right now, God loves you and wants to be in relationship with you.

God freely offers us love and forgiveness, even though we don't deserve it.

Justifying Grace

For people who follow Jesus, there is a single moment in time or a realization over months or years when you recognize God's grace at work in your life and on your soul.

You consciously make a decision to respond to God's love.

We confess our sins, receive forgiveness, trust in God and seek to follow Jesus.

We are justified, or made right. with God.

This is a milestone in our life of faith, but it is not the end of the way that God's grace is at work in our souls.

Sanctifying Grace

God's grace continues to be at work in our lives and in our souls. We talk about as an experience of being made perfect in love. We continue to grow in our faith throughout our lives.

Grow on Our Own

God brings spiritual growth in our lives, but there are things that we can do on our own to make ourselves more receptive to the work of God's grace in our soul. Two of these practices to read the Bible and pray.

Read the Bible

Reading the bible can be a powerful way for us to grow in our faith. The Bible gives us the clearest picture of Jesus and in Jesus we see the clearest picture of God.

- Pick up a Bible from the church
- Visit bible.com/app on your phone

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- · Use the bulletin as a guide
- Read the book of Mark

Here are some ways that you can get started reading the Bible:

- If you need one, we will give you a Bible for free. Stop by the office afterward and you can take one from the shelf
- If you have a mobile device, **download the Bible app.** Use a reading plan or take notes during worship using events.
- **Use the bulletin** to be a tool for you to grow in your faith. Each week you can read the scripture for next Sunday to prepare for worship. This is just one of the many ways you can engage in the Bible.
- If you want to engage more, **read the gospel according to Mark**. You can find it in the table of contents. It is one of the books that tells the story of Jesus. It is short, action packed, and reading it could change your life.

Pray

Another simple and powerful way to grow in your faith is to pray and spend time with God. Take time to listen and speak. Relationships are built when you spend time with someone and share a conversation.

- · Pray when you wake up
- Pray before meals
- · Pray at bedtime
- · Church, Community, Country, World

Here are some ways that you can get started praying:

- When you wake up, "God, thank you for waking me up this morning. Help me to live for you today."
- Before meals, "O God, bless this food we are about to eat. Help it nourish our bodies so that we might follow after you."
- · At bedtime, we say this prayer with our children,

"Now I lay me down to sleep.

I pray the Lord my soul to keep.

Guide me through the starry night

and wake me when the sun shines bright.

 Change club to church in the last line of the 4-H pledge and pray for my church, my community, my country and my world.

Next Step

God's grace works on us throughout our lives.

Reading the Bible and praying make us receptive to God's grace at work on our soul.





Response to Video

Who are your supporters?

Stretcher Bearers

Key Scripture: Mark 2:1-5

One of the stories of Jesus helps us understand the power of supporters in our life. We find it in Mark 2 and it goes like this:

"After a few days, Jesus went back to Capernaum, and people heard that he was at home. So many gathered that there was no longer space, not even near the door. Jesus was speaking the word to them.

Some people arrived, and four of them were bringing to him a man who was paralyzed. They couldn't carry him through the crowd, so they tore off part of the roof

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above where Jesus was. When they had made an opening, they lowered the mat on which the paralyzed man was lying.

When Jesus saw their faith, he said to the paralytic, "Child, your sins are forgiven!"5

Imagine the Story

Can you imagine this story?

People had gathered in such large numbers to hear Jesus that there was no room left, not even at the door.

Four men come, carrying a paralyzed man. They couldn't get to Jesus because of the crowd, so they "tore off part of the roof above where Jesus was. ... and lowered the mat on which the paralyzed man was lying."

It was most likely a thatched roof, so this would have been possible, but messy. These four men literally dug through the roof for their friend.

His sins are forgiven and when people question, that, Jesus says, 'Get up, take your mat, and go home.' He does.

This man is healed because his four friends cared enough to bring him to Jesus.

Grow with Others

We can grow in our faith outside of worship on our own by reading the Bible and praying and there is something more when we grow in our faith with others.

We want to create as many opportunities as we can for you to be part of a group where people not only know your name, what you care about, what your fears are, where you struggle in your faith. These are people that you can ask, "How is it with your soul?" and you can really tell them.

Accountability, encouragement, care - all these things open our life to God's grace in deep ways and help us love God... and love each other. Being part of a small group focused on spiritual formation is a powerful way to stay connected with Jesus and allow your faith to grow.

Video Transcript

Becky: There are times when things can get so stressful. And I wish I did this more often – "Let's go to the pasture." And we just get in a buggy and we drive. ... This land is very deep, it's not very wide, but it's very deep, so you can drive quite a ways before you get to the back fence. ...



It's a time for Carroll and I to commune, for us to talk, share thoughts - our stresses, and we need to do it more often. You know, you get caught up in the time and "I have to do this..." and "I have to do that..." and "He has to do this..." and "He has to do that..." And, it's just very, it reassures you why you are here and what you are doing - what you are supposed to be doing.

Connection to Life / Response to Video

This description of time together gives me a picture of what it is like to stay connected with God. Time with God on our own or with other people is a chance to commune, share your thoughts and stresses.

God's grace can bring an assurance which we can find nowhere else.
