Flint Hills at Night

It seemed like the stars would never end.

The band of the Milky Way, the planets.

It was beautiful!

Then, a shooting star made it's way across the sky.

Incredible.

Psalm 19

I imagine that the Psalmist looked up at the stars on a beautiful night like that. Then wrote, "Heaven is declaring God's glory; the sky is proclaiming his handiwork."

I believe that this is supposed to be our response.

Beauty like this moves you.

You see it and say, "LORD, our Lord, how majestic is your name throughout the earth!"2

Believe Worship Series

During this worship series, we are exploring the essential beliefs of the Christian faith and why these beliefs matter. These are the truths that give meaning and purpose to life.

Throughout this series, we will make use of the Apostles' Creed, a statement of faith that may have developed in the second half of the first or the second century.

It is a series of statements whose words or ideas come from the scriptures.

We will consider one phrase each week and, along the way, try to memorize the Apostles' Creed before Easter.

Today's Phrase of the Apostles' Creed

God is all powerful

Creation

Key Scripture - Genesis 1:1, NIV

Our understanding of God begins at the very beginning of scripture

"In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth."3

I love these 4 words at the beginning of the Bible:

In the beginning God.

It is such a beautiful portrait of the very beginning of time.

Key Scripture - Genesis 1:1-5, NIV

"In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth. Now the earth was formless and empty, darkness was over the surface of the deep, and the Spirit of God was hovering over the waters. And God said, "Let there be light," and there was light. God saw that the light was good, and he separated the light from the darkness. God called the light "day," and the darkness he called "night." And there was evening, and there was morning—the first day."4

A Scientific Description of Beginning of Time

This doesn't sound far from what some physicists and biologists say was part of life in the beginning.

Primordial chaos.

God spoke. There was a big bang.

Then, suddenly, and over time, light and life come out of chaos.

Force Connecting All Existence

This is one of the ways that we think about God - the force behind everything that exists. Everything that exists, exists because of this force, this life, this power, this energy. God binds all things together and holds it all together. God is all powerful.

Video Illustration - Yoda Describes the Force


This understanding of God is one that many people could agree on - whether or not they profess to Christian or not. In fact, you can find one of the best descriptions of this way of understanding God in one of the best movie series of all time - Star Wars.

You may remember in Episode IV, Luke Skywalker has sought out Yoda to be trained as a Jedi. He has started his training and is complaining how difficult it is. In this clip, Yoda tells Luke about the source of his power. His ally is the force. Let's take a look...

Video Wrap Up

It's energy surrounds us and binds us.

You must feel the force around you.

Everywhere.

This is one part of belief in God, and yet, it is not all there is.

This description, by itself, is not a Christian understanding of God.

Transition

God is all powerful, yet there are at least two more ways to understand God which we must know as Christians. The first is that God is personal.

God is Personal

Created in the Image of God

God is not some impersonal force. Instead, God defines what we describe as personhood. Individuality, intellect, logic, will, emotion, relation, all of these things come from and are characteristic of God.

The fact that we have them is what we mean when say that we were created in the image of God. We don't physically look like God, but the stuff that defines what it means to be a person is the stuff that's derived from the personhood of God.

Moses and the Burning Bush

One of the places that we see this in the scriptures is in the story of Moses and the Burning Bush. In the book of Exodus, we find the story of the people of Israel who have been slaves in Egypt for hundreds of years and God has heard their cries for help.

Multitude of Gods in Egypt

You remember that the Egyptians believe in a multitude of gods. God has seen the Israelites, these slaves, and God has compassion upon them.

Moses checks out the burning bush

In the middle of the wilderness, far from where the people are enslaved, an old man, Moses, is tending his sheep. He sees a bush that's on fire and he goes to find out what's going on.

Moses hears a voice

Suddenly, he hears a voice coming out of the bush and it says, "Moses you're standing on holy ground, take off your shoes."

He takes off his sandals and then hears this voice say again, "I have seen the suffering of my people and I have compassion on them. I have remembered them and I am sending you to deliver them from Pharaoh, to deliver them from slavery in Egypt."

Moses needs some convincing, which God is able to do. So, then, Moses then rightly asks this question, "Well, okay, there are lots of gods, which one are you?"

Key Scripture - Exodus 3:13-14

The scripture reads like this:

"13But Moses said to God, "If I now come to the Israelites and say to them, 'The God of your ancestors has sent me to you,' they are going to ask me, 'What's this God's name?' What am I supposed to say to them?"

¹⁴God said to Moses, "I Am Who I Am. So say to the Israelites, 'I Am has sent me to you." ⁵

I Am

Tetragrammaton

I Am Who I Am is a pretty unusual name, even for God. In Hebrew, it is four letters:

יהוה

Tetragrammaton

Hebrew name for God

It is represented by four letters Yod. He. Waw. He.

It is known as the tetragrammaton, which means four letters.

It is sometimes poorly transliterated as Yahweh or Jehovah.

Significance of God's Name

So, what kind of name is that for God?

I think what God was saying, I am existence itself.

-

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I am being itself.

I am.

Everything else that you know as being or existence was derived from Me, it finds itself formed because of Me.

It's held together as a result of my power.

I am.

God has a Conversation with Moses

What is even more interesting here is that God is having a conversation with Moses. It's not just that God is like the force that Yoda describes.

God is personal.

We see the truth of a personal God throughout the scriptures, especially in the incarnation.

Transition

God is all powerful.

God is personal.

... and God is relational.

Conclusion

God is Relational

This brings us back to the first phrase of the Apostle's Creed.

I believe in God the Father Almighty, maker of heaven and earth;

Father is relational

God is not only all powerful - maker of heaven and earth.

God is not only personal - a person who has a name.

God is relational - I believe in God the Father.

Father is a relational term.

Personal Example: Love of Children

As a father, I think about my own children. I love them.

We made a decision that we wanted to bring life into this world.

There's a relationship that we have. It is based on love.

Not a set amount of love that runs out if it gets spread around, but that kind of love that overflows and expands and reaches deep into the life of every person.

Good News

The good news is that God is an all powerful, personal, and relational. God wants to be in relationship with you.
