Participate in Children's Spiritual Formation

Key Scripture - Deuteronomy 6:7-9

"7Recite them to your children. Talk about them when you are sitting around your house and when you are out and about, when you are lying down and when you are getting up. 8Tie them on your hand as a sign. They should be on your forehead as a symbol. 9Write them on your house's doorframes and on your city's gates."3

"Adults, starting with parents, are commanded to be active participants in their children's spiritual formation. [These verses] indicate paretns' responsibility and agreement to teach their children about the Lord. The action verbs ... indicate constant process and interaction."

Research

Parents are usually the most important influence in their kids' lives.

"[Based on his research], Dr. Christian Smith from the University of Notre Dame concluded:
"Most teenagers and their parents may not realize it, but a lot of research in the sociology of religion suggests that the most important social influence in shaping young people's religious lives is the religious life modeled and taught to them by their parents.
[Dr. Smith] put it even more simply and succinctly
"When it comes to kids' faith, parents get what they are."
"Of course there are exceptions. Your faith may be vastly different from the faith

"Of course there are exceptions. Your faith may be vastly different from the faith of your parents. Plus, I've met plenty of dedicated Christian parents whose kids end up all over the faith spectrum. But parents are more than an initial launch pad for their kids' journey; they continue to shape them as an ongoing companion and guide." 5

Most parents miss out on the opportunity to talk about faith with their kids.

"According to the Search Institute's nationwide study, ... 12 percent of youth have a regular dialogue with their mom on faith / life issues. In other words, one out of eight kids talks with Mom about faith.

It's far lower for dads. One out of twenty, or 5 percent, of kids have regular faith / life conversations with Dad.

One additional interesting statistic: Approximately 9 percent of teenagers engage in regular reading of the Bible and devotions with their families. So not even one out of ten teenagers looks at Scripture with their parents. When it comes to matters of faith, mum's usually the word at home."6

The best discussions about faith happen when parents don't just ask questions, but also share their own experiences.

"The relatively small percentage of parents who *do* talk with their kids about faith tend to default to asking their kids questions.

What did you talk about in church today?

How was youth group?

What did you think of the sermon?

Depending on the personality and mood of the kid, responses usually range from grunts to "the usual." Not very satisfying for the parent or the kid.

... Research shows that asking these questions can pay off. But what is vital ... is that parents also *share about their own faith*.

In other words, parents shouldn't merely interview their kids; they need to *discuss* their own faith journeys, including both ups and downs.

[Parents may say] that ... living out their faith in front of their kids is more important than merely talking about it.

I'll quickly concede that who we are as parents has a much greater impact than what we say. If I had to choose between living out my faith and talking about my faith around my own kids, I'd chose the former every time.

But I don't have to choose. And neither do [you]. Parents can do both.7
